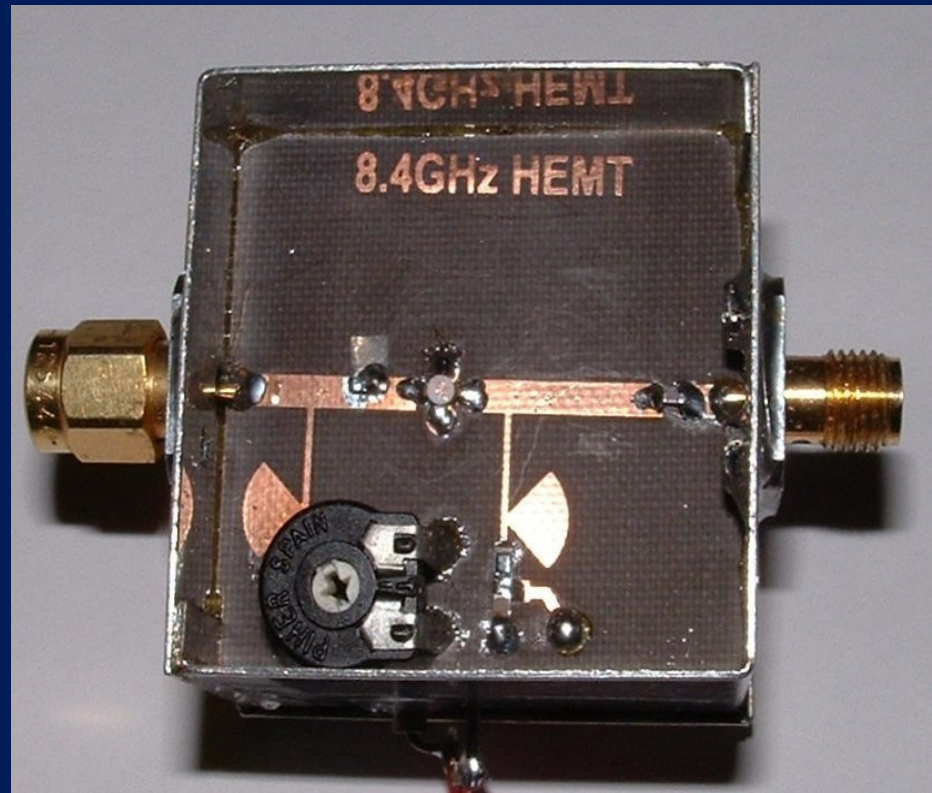

# Direct Reception of Signals from Mars

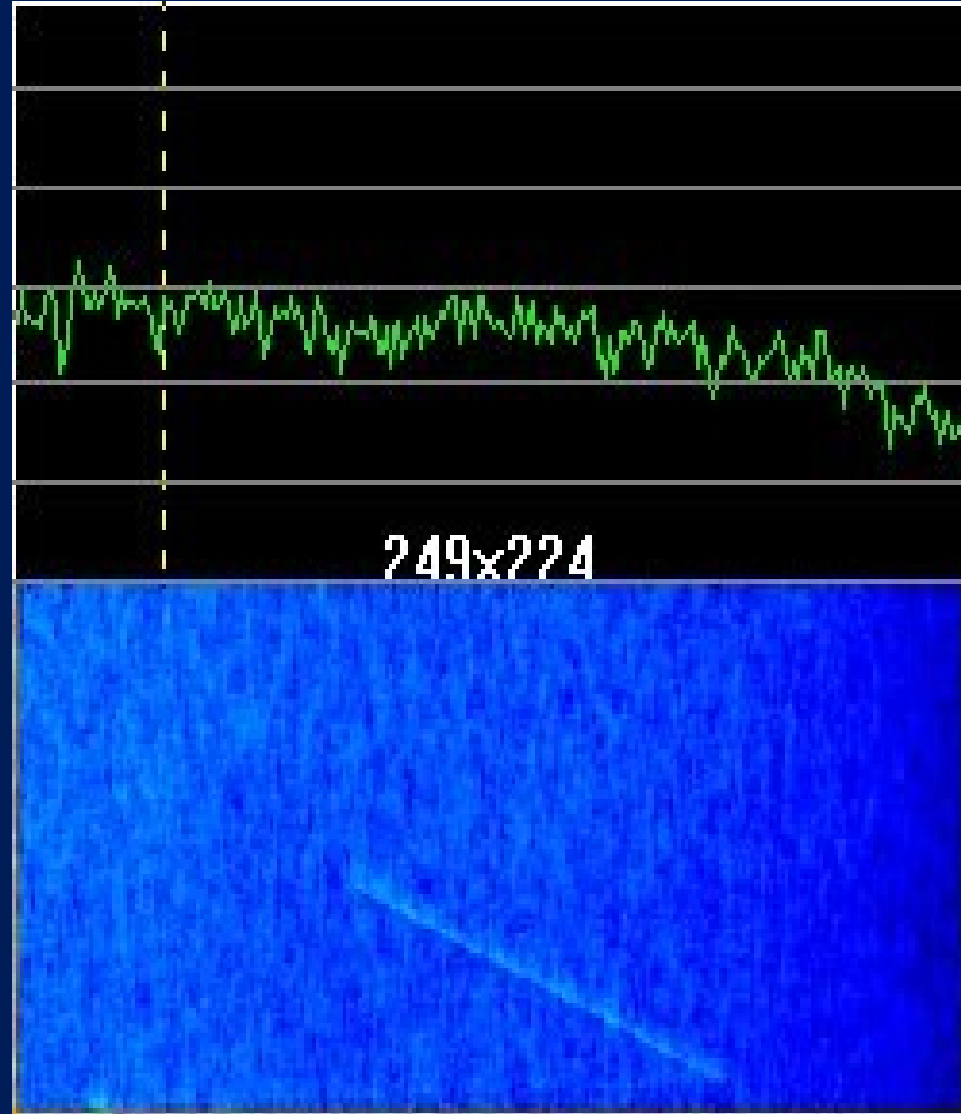
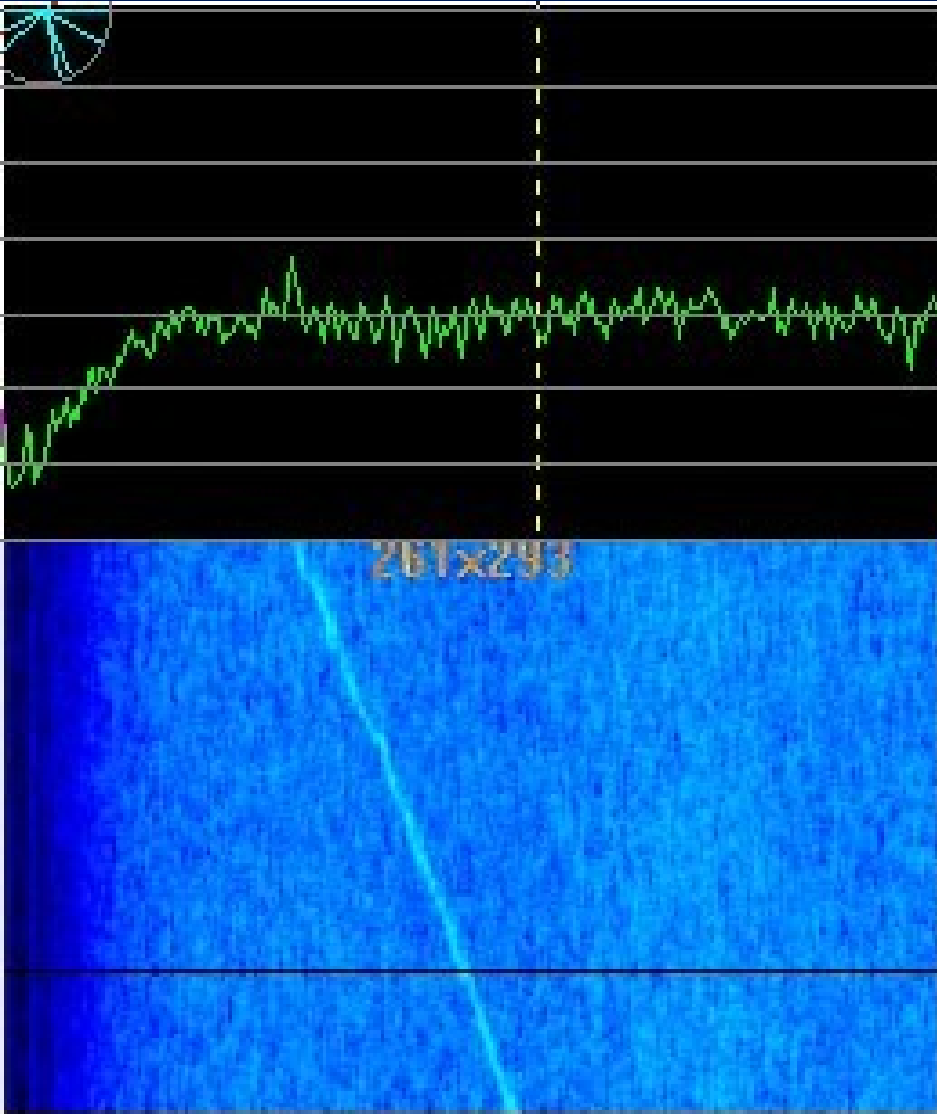


- G3WDG successfully receiving signals from Mars...

# Objectives



- Try something a little different ... well, ok, maybe not all that different...

- In the process, perhaps you'll come to understand why I remain so undauntably optimistic about the future of Free Software and the positive impact that our collected work is having.

- The dictionary says that a “Commons” is:
  - A public pasture ground
  - A piece of open land for recreational use in an urban area
- Governments as caretakers of various commons.
- The provisions of licenses like the GPL, and the community development model that they encourage, create a commons for software.
- The Tragedy of the Commons
  - an idea at least as old as Aristotle
  - popularized by Garrett James Hardin, 1915-2003
  - assumes that the resources of the commons are limited
- The Free Software commons has no such limitations!

- The dictionary defines “community” as:
  - A body of people having common rights, privileges, or interests, or living in the same place under the same laws and regulations.
  - Of common character, likeness, frequency
- The Internet enables the formation of a new class of communities that could not previously exist.
  - People with common interests or values
  - Potentially broadly geographically distributed
- Inability to participate in the growing society of Internet-enabled communities is a fundamental problem, often called the “digital divide”

# On my first trip to Brazil...



- A startling thing happened when I walked onto the vendor floor at the Forum International Software Livre...
- A representative of the city government handed me a CD, the label of which said “Porto Alegre GNU/Linux”, with four interesting logos on it:
  - Debian-RS
  - The City of Porto Alegre
  - The State of Rio Grande do Sul
  - The Country of Brazil
- Several thousand copies have been distributed to citizens of the region (3000 at FISL 2003 alone!).
- The former governor of this state is now the president...



# Extremadura



- A region in the South-West of Spain, near the Portugese border, with a population of about one million people.
- One of the poorest regions in Spain, facing difficult economic challenges.
- A place where 80,000 Linux desktop computers have been deployed, one for every two students in the public school system!
- A model for successful large-scale Linux deployments in government and education that many hope to duplicate.

- There was nothing “quick” or “easy” about how the government of Extremadura went about this deployment!
  - 5 years, designing and implementing comprehensive plans
- LinEx is the Debian-derived Linux distribution created in Extremadura as a key component of their Technology Literacy Plan, and the Educational Technology Network project started in 1998.
- Beyond traditional localization, interface menus apply local dialect and idiom...
- In addition to 80,000 desktops deployed in the schools, over 20,000 live-run CDROMs have been distributed to ordinary citizens!

- The region of Spain including Seville
  - Planning an Extremadura-like massive Linux deployment
  - Building a Debian-derived distribution of their own, starting with LinEx and using Metadistros.

  - Over 30,000 CDRoms deployed to ordinary citizens, in advance of the planned educational and government office deployments...

- And other regions of Spain, like the Canary Islands, are watching and planning similar deployments...

# What is Debian?

- 'The Debian Project is an association of individuals who have made common cause to create a free operating system.'
- More specifically, Debian:
  - is one of the most popular GNU/Linux distributions
  - runs on the most architectures
  - is a completely open volunteer organization
  - is quite international
  - is the largest GNU/Linux distribution
  - works with companies to develop and maintain software
  - is Focused on Freedom
  - is well represented in the Free Software world

# Evolution of the Debian Community

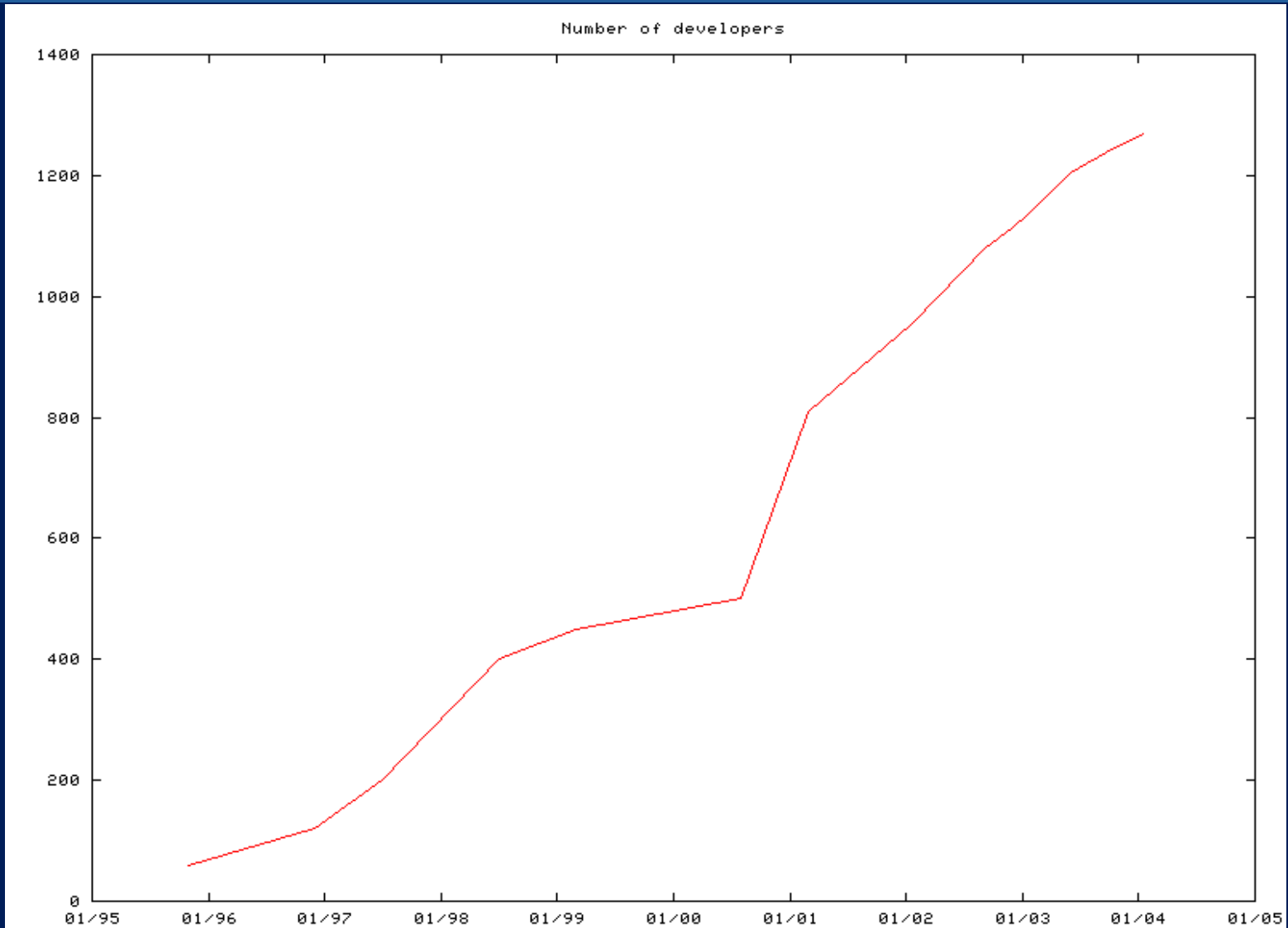


- Ian Murdock's Debian Manifesto attracted people excited by the idea of Free Software to join the project
- The Social Contract and associated Debian Free Software Guidelines articulated the core set of shared values of the growing Debian community. Acceptance of these values became a criteria for acceptance into the community.
- As the community continued to evolve, a constitution was drafted to clarify roles and responsibilities, and to provide for conflict resolution and decision making.
- The Debian community continues to evolve, but the results already speak for themselves...

# A Few Debian Statistics

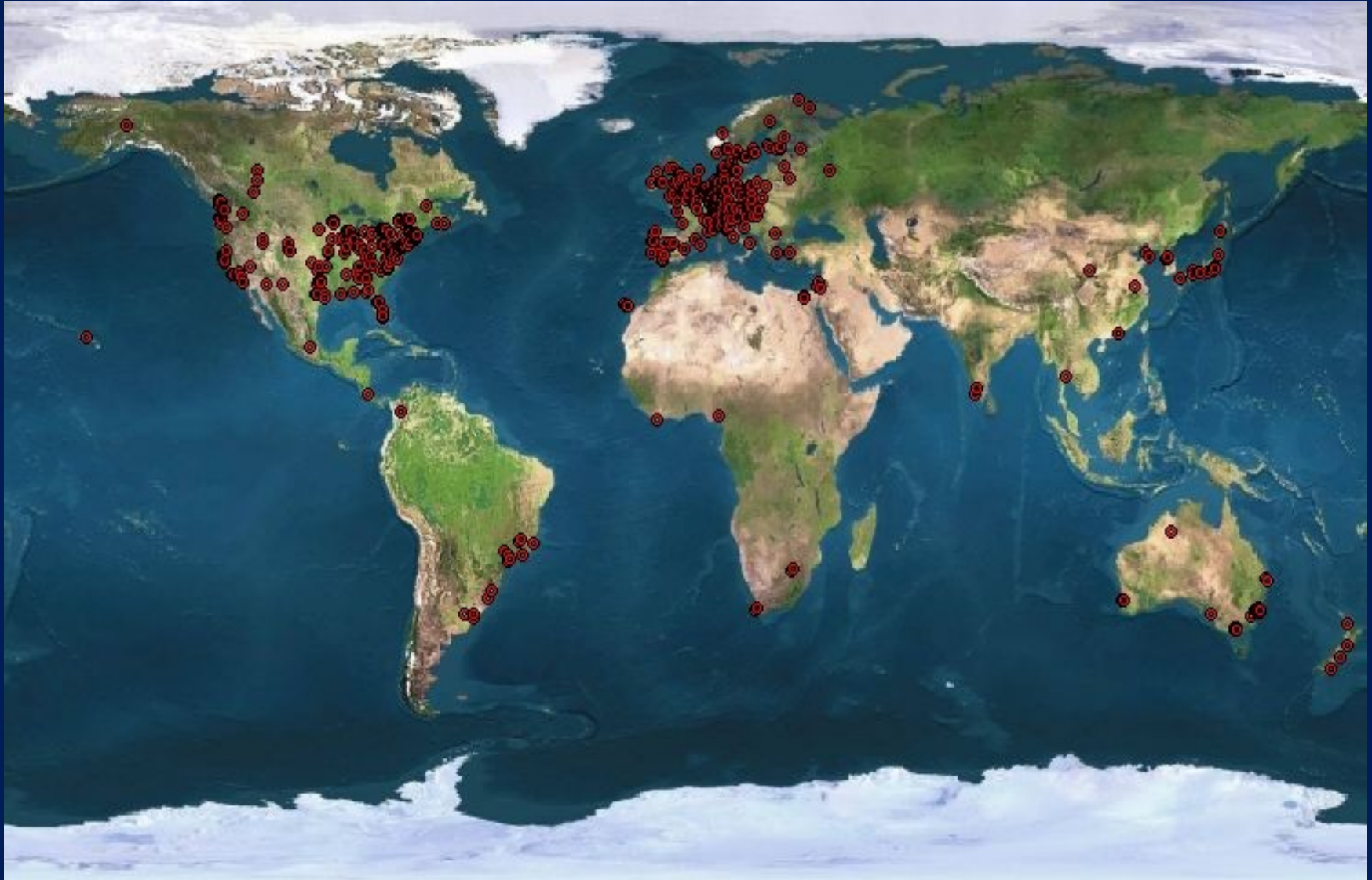
- Debian runs on everything from handhelds to mainframes
- 11 released architectures
  - alpha arm hppa i386 ia64 m68k mips[el] powerpc s390 sparc
- port underway to AMD Opteron
- also working with HURD and BSD kernels
- Debian's technology, policies, and packages form the basis for a rich variety of custom and derived distributions.
  - 1268 people
  - 8103 source packages
  - 13739 binary packages

# Number of Debian Developers

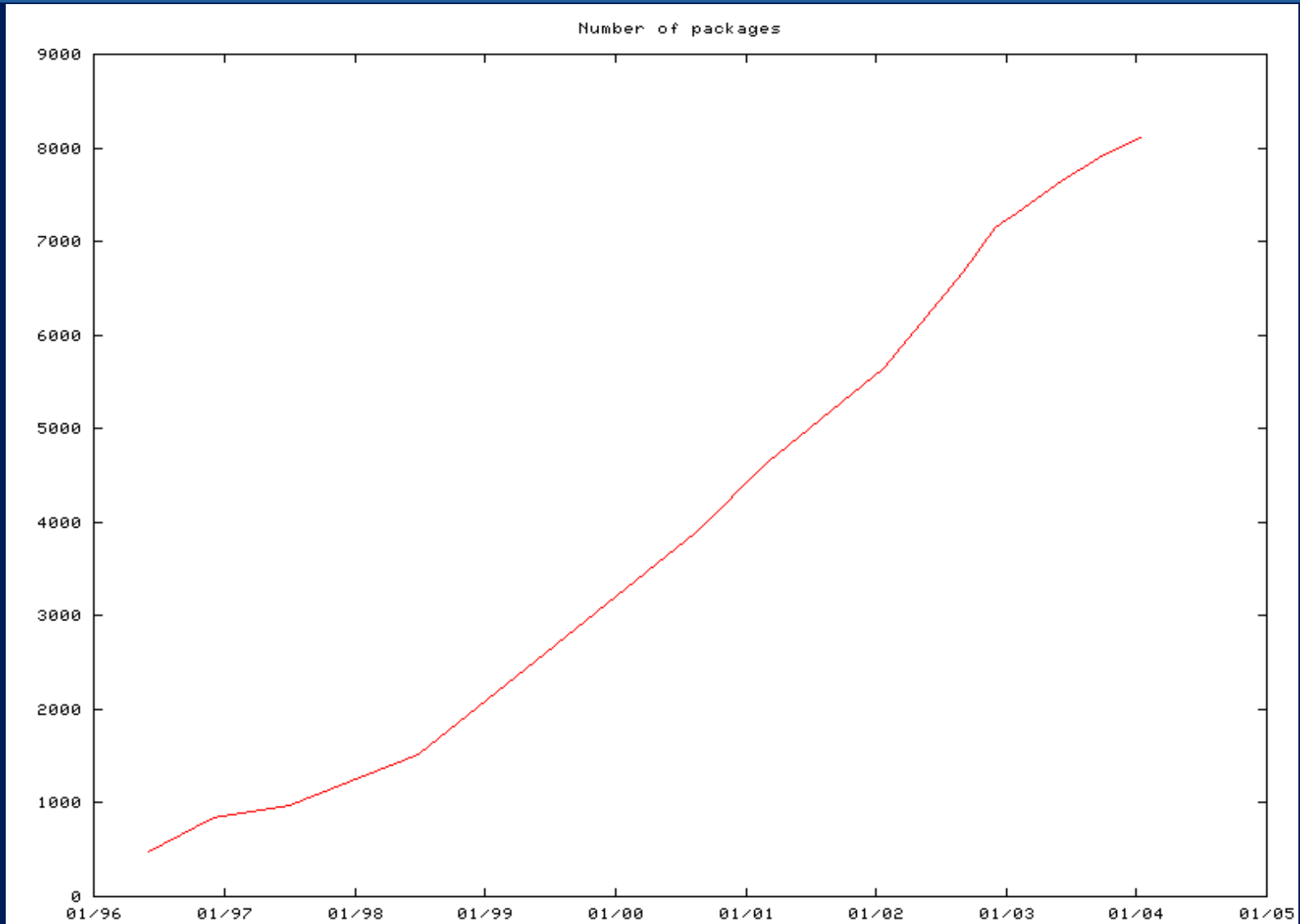




# Map of Debian Developers

- Linux Journal 2003 Readers' Choice Awards
  - Debian won the category of “Favourite Distribution”
- Linux Enterprise Reader's Choice 2003
  - Debian won the category “Best Enterprise Distribution”
- Linux New Media Award 2003
  - Debian won the category “Best Distribution”
  - Along with Knoppix, which is derived from Debian, they received more than 60% of the votes.

# Conclusions



- Free Software makes sense to many governments
  - The freedom to pick and choose, and customize/localize
  - Investments
    - Less total cost than proprietary software
    - Local investments in education and building a software industry are better than sending hard currency overseas.
- Successful large-scale public deployments of Linux don't “just happen”
  - Political and economic will are required
  - Big projects take time ... Extremadura started in 1998!
- Many such deployments are now in the discussion and planning stages

- We should not be surprised that Debian is often chosen
  - Open and inclusive, focus on Freedom
  - Existence proof for the community development model
- The core values associated with Free Software attract strong support.
  - People, hardware, and bandwidth...
  - Direct investment in development, integration, and deployment by governments and educational institutions.
- Debian continues to be one of the most successful volunteer projects ever.
  - Well over 1000 **VOLUNTEERS** around the world.
  - **Delivering real value to meet real world needs.**
