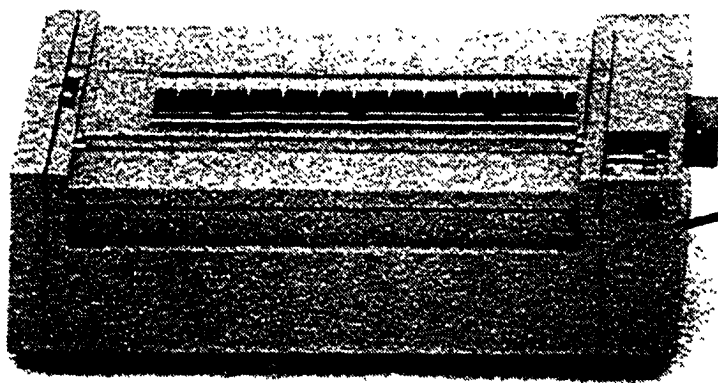


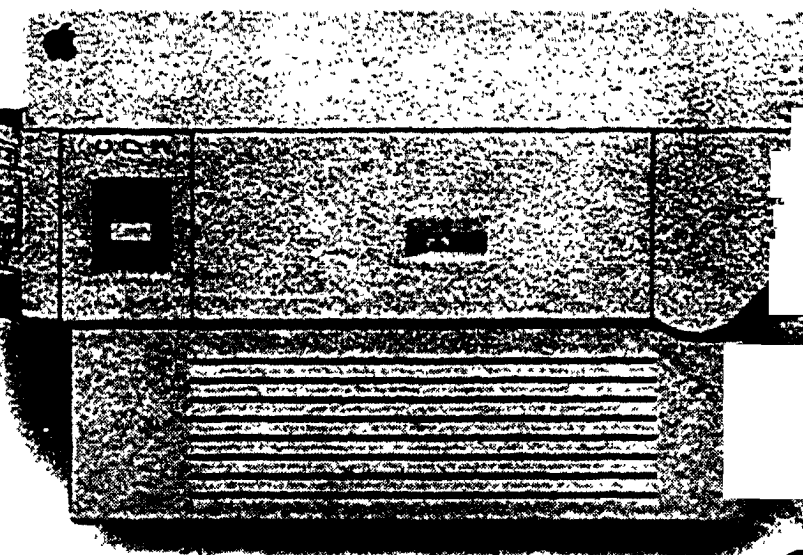

You can also add other printers besides LaserWriter to The Macintosh Office. Including our stand-alone ImageWriter™ dot matrix printer you see here, as well as letter-quality daisywheel printers you don't see here.

It's only the size of a desktop copier, yet the LaserWriter printer, which will be coming next month, contains the most powerful computer Apple has ever sold. Along with four typefaces in a variety of styles and virtually unlimited sizes. And since it also has AppleTalk built into it, LaserWriter can be shared by everyone in The Macintosh Office.

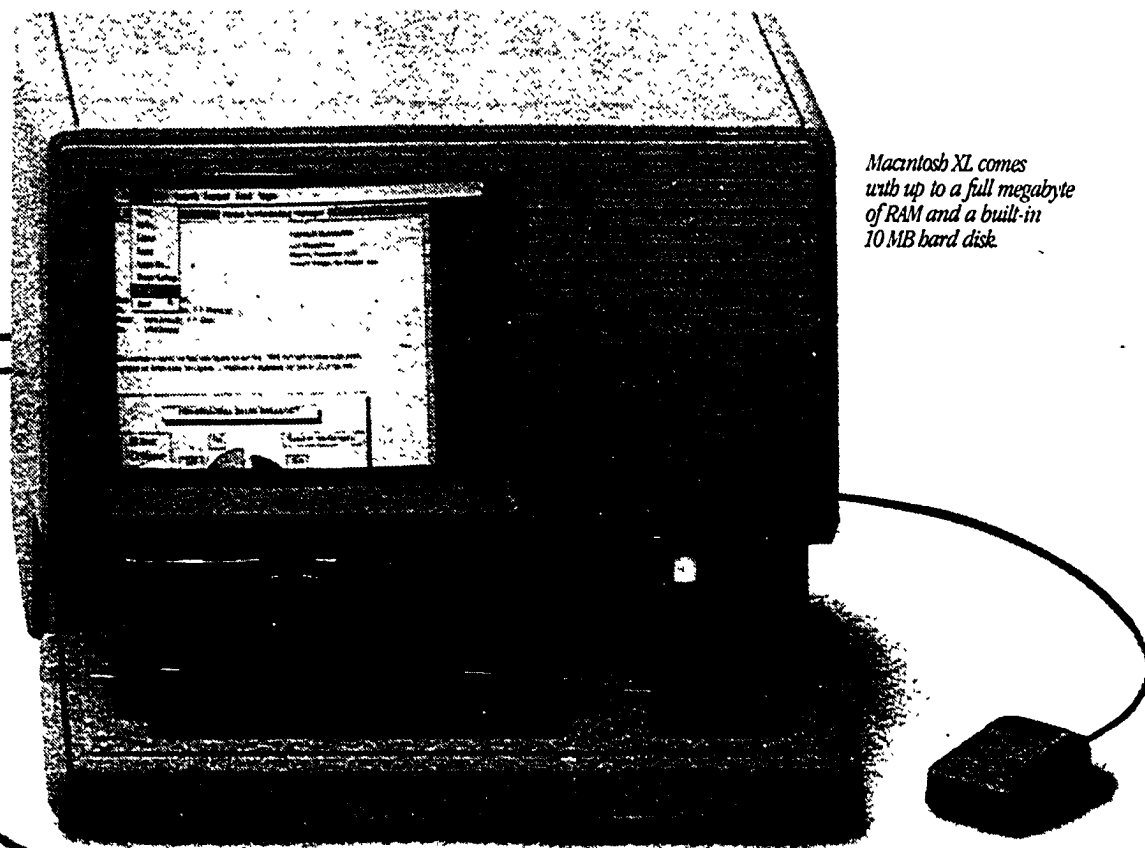
Right now, IBM-PC's can use our new LaserWriter printer. Later this year, we'll be introducing the AppleTalk card that fits into an IBM PC. It'll allow a PC to trade information with Macintosh and access file servers. As well as serve as a gateway between the IBM PC network and our AppleTalk network.



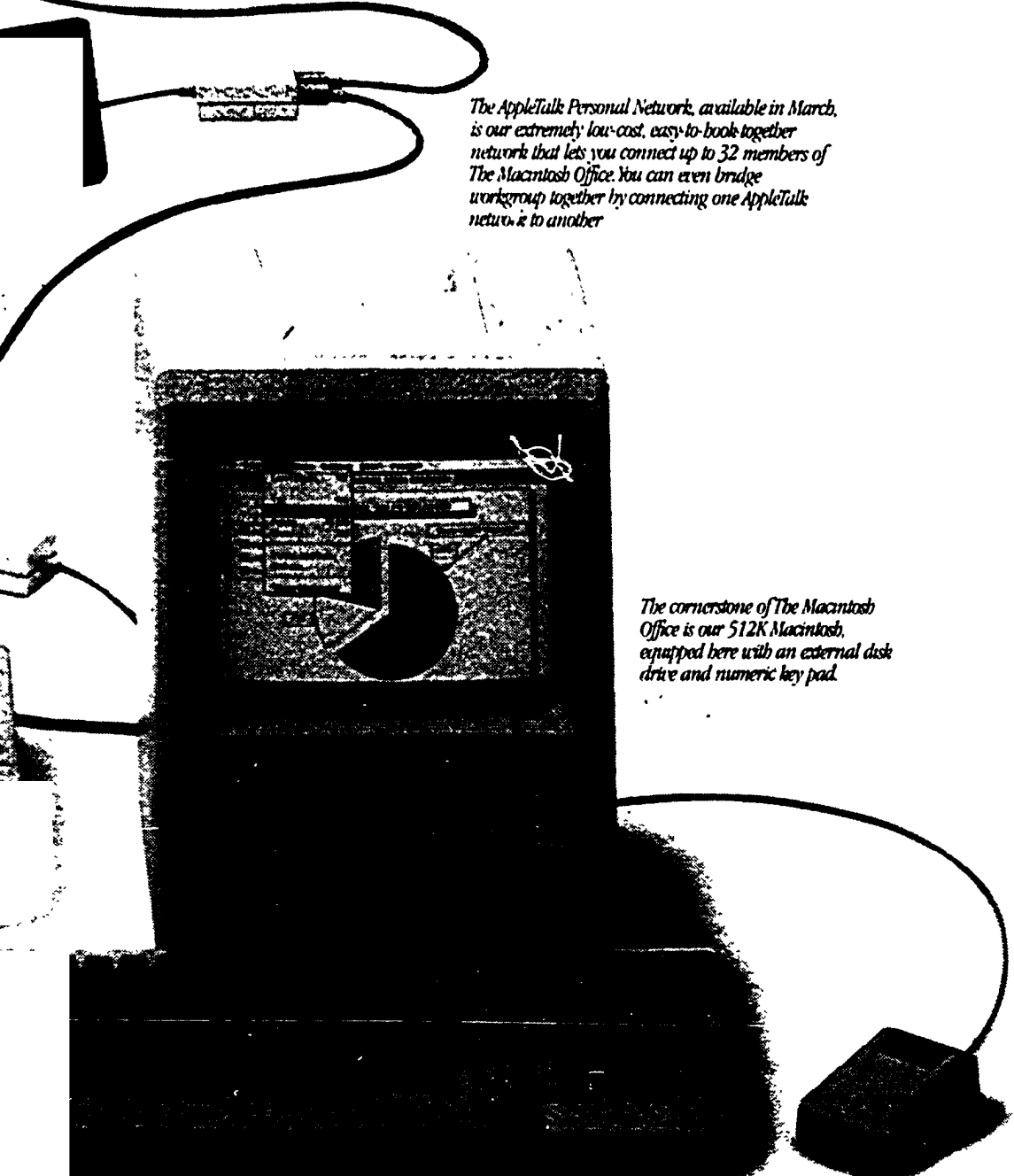
Our entry-level workstation in The Macintosh Office is, naturally enough, the Macintosh 128K. No matter what kind of desk you put it on, the person behind it will already know how to use it.

IBM is finally talking to us, thanks to the AppleLine protocol converter and our MacTerminal software. Together, they let you communicate directly with your mainframe via 3270 emulation.

Macintosh Office. What's added is people.



Macintosh XL comes with up to a full megabyte of RAM and a built-in 10 MB hard disk.



The AppleTalk Personal Network, available in March, is our extremely low-cost, easy-to-hook-together network that lets you connect up to 32 members of The Macintosh Office. You can even bridge workgroups together by connecting one AppleTalk network to another.

The cornerstone of The Macintosh Office is our 512K Macintosh, equipped here with an external disk drive and numeric key pad.

No, not computer systems people to help you design it.

Not contractors to help you install it. Not even expert computer people to show you how to use it.

But the kind of people who already make up most of your office.

Managers and professionals. People who spend most of their time selling products, services or, most importantly, ideas.

Because, unlike traditional office computer solutions, we didn't design The Macintosh Office around a mainframe. We designed it around an idea.

The idea that people, not mainframes, are the most important information centers in an office. And that most things in business are really accomplished by teams of 5 to 25 people who need to share information with each other. What we call the *workgroup*.

That's why we put Macintosh at the heart of The Macintosh Office. Its powerful, 32-bit technology reduces the time it takes to become productive with a computer from well over a work week, to just under a lunch hour.

For the first time, the people who could really use a computer — managers and professionals — had a computer they could really use. In their choice of sizes: Macintosh 128K, Macintosh 512K and Macintosh XL.

Then we designed a network solution for workgroups of 5 to 25. Instead of buildings of 500 to 2,500.

We call it the AppleTalk Personal Network. It's as easy to hook together as an extension cord. And almost as cheap. Less than \$50* a desk, versus up to \$1,200 for a typical network system.

Since the number one product of business is still paper, we found a way to make every sheet count. A breakthrough in printed communications we call the LaserWriter printer.

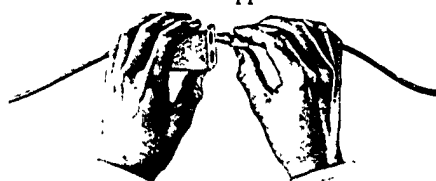
Simply put, it's a print shop inside a 16" x 18" box that produces publication-quality text and graphics. Which, according to a recent survey by Boston University, will make your reports, presentations and overheads 65.6% more persuasive.

For your information, we'll be introducing an Apple file server later this year. It'll let you electronically store, retrieve and E-mail all those files, reports and memos that keep sliding off the pile in your in-box.

We've also found a way for The Macintosh Office to share offices with IBM.

Right now, Macintoshes can talk to IBM mainframes in their own 3270 language. And IBM PC's can use our LaserWriter printer.

Later on, we'll have an AppleTalk card that slips into an IBM PC. It'll allow PC's to trade information with Macintoshes. Access our file server. And it'll serve as a gateway between the IBM PC network and our AppleTalk network.

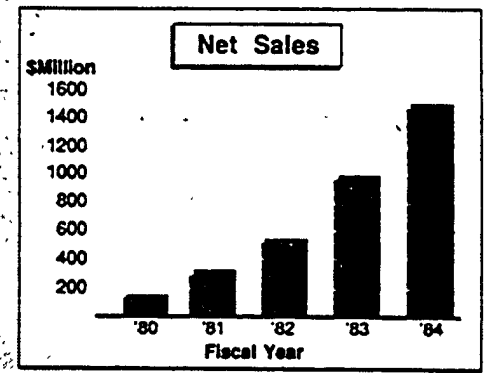


The AppleTalk Personal Network is as easy to install as this. No internal cards, expensive control units or special software is required.
