U.C.L.A. SIT-IN BACKS BERKELEY ACTIVISTS

LOS ANGELES, May 21—
About 1,000 students at the University of California at Los Angeles sat in at the school's administration building today to demonstrate support for student activists at the university's Berkeley campus.

A statement issued by a coalition of U.C.L.A. student organizations said the students were also demanding an end to the campus Reserve Officers Training Corps and war-related research, and the removal of police from the U.C.L.A. campus.

The demonstration began

after a noon rally in memory of James Rector, the young man killed in a clash with the police at Berkeley last week. Students remained orderly, blocking on corridors or offices, and said they would leave quietly whenever the police declared the protest an illegal assembly.
