

# REAGAN REMOVING BERKELEY TROOPS

State of Emergency Is Also  
Due to Be Lifted Today

SACRAMENTO, Calif., June 2 — Gov. Ronald Reagan announced today that the National Guard would be withdrawn from Berkeley and that a state of emergency would be lifted from the city at 6 A.M. tomorrow.

Berkeley, the scene of violent demonstrations in recent weeks, has been quiet for several days.

The Governor said he was acting at the request of University of California and Berkeley city officials, with the concurrence of local law enforcement officers.

National Guard troops were ordered into Berkeley May 15 when rioting broke out following action by university officials to close the "people's park," a piece of property that had been used by students and Berkeley "street people."

The state of emergency was proclaimed by the Governor Feb. 5.

## To Help Insure Safety

Governor Reagan's announcement noted that the state of emergency had been proclaimed at the request of the Alameda County Sheriff and university officials "to help insure the safety of persons and property in the area."

The Governor said that it would continue to be his policy "to provide to local authorities whatever state assistance may be necessary to enforce the law and protect the lives and property of our citizens."

Governor Reagan added:

"I want to take this opportunity to commend members of the California Highway Patrol and National Guard as well as local law enforcement officials for the outstanding way in which they discharged their duties, including the remarkable restraint they displayed in the face of extreme provocation, continuing abuse and serious physical injury.

"I know that I speak for the vast majority of their fellow citizens in expressing sincere thanks for a job well done."
